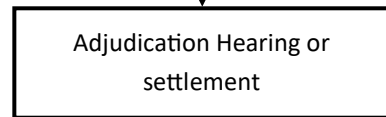


(A decision made by a judge without requiring all of the parties to be present.)

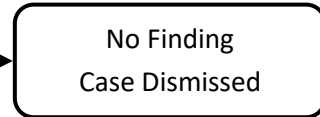
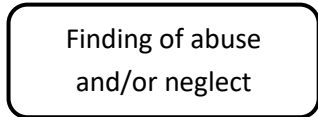


Should be held no later than 8 days after the child's removal from home.

For children removed from home, this should occur within 60 days of the petition being filed.



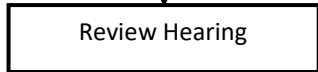
For children not removed from the home, this should occur within 90 days of the petition being filed.



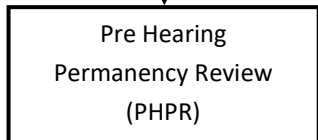
(Judge orders what happens next)



Should be held within 45 days from the adjudication hearing.

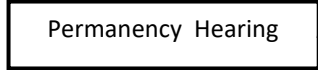


Occurs every 6 months for the life of the case.

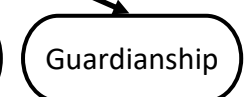
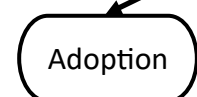
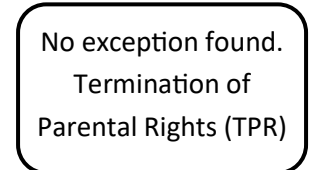
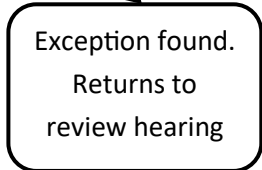
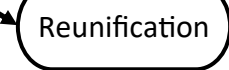
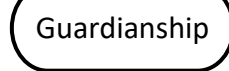


Only happens in some jurisdictions
